In science, we are learning about different trees, their seeds. We watched several videos of how trees change in a year, and we decided to adopt one tree in our school. We will take weekly photos and write about changes that we can see. Hopefully, at the end of this academic year we can make our own video about this tree.



In Forest school, Maple class together with Acorn class enjoyed making leaf angels. We didn't get dirty this time, only played with colorful, crunchy leaves. I wonder if you can spot your child between the leaves? Also, we made some beautiful poppies for Remembrance Day.








Rowan Class



We are now halfway through our Brain Buddies sessions. Every Wednesday Caroline and Emma come and spend about an hour with us teaching us how our brains work, about our emotions and lots of strategies we can use to help us. We use the 4 zones that we use in class – blue, green, yellow and red. We can be in all of the zones within a few minutes and it changes throughout the day. The strategies we are practising could help us to return to the green zone.

There are a lot of strategies to learn! This is because one will work for some of us, but not for others. We have to find the ones that work best for us. We also practice them in class and discuss which ones we like. We could use a breathing skill; do chair push ups or finger pulls or use a distraction strategy like 5 senses. Please ask us if you want to know more.

Another thing we have been doing is thinking about our calm kits – things that we can do that will help us be calm. Some of the things in our kits include reading, drawing, colouring, chair push ups, finding a quiet space; playing with our friends and cuddling our pets. Miss Radford's calm kit has her dog; a book; and a great cup of tea.







Oak Class



Since half term, we have been looking at new topics in both our curriculum sessions of science and history.

In science, we have been focusing on changes and properties of materials. This week, we conducted an investigation to see whether mixing substances would make a mixture or a solution. We used a range of substances (herbs, sugar, salt, sand etc) and then observed what happened to the water when they mixed them. Some substances appeared to 'disappear' but we decided that they had dissolved into the water; this created a solution. Parents – challenge your children to tell you the definitions of a mixture and a solution.

In history, we have started studying the Ancient Greeks. We have already learned briefly about the major events in the Ancient Greek timeline including the rise and fall of King Alexander the Great; the establishment of the city states Sparta and Athens and the decline in power of the Ancient Greeks as they lost the Battle of Corinth to the Romans. We have specifically been looking at whether they were a part of the Archaic, Classical or Hellenistic periods and we are looking forward to learning about some of these events in more detail!

This has also linked nicely in with our English topic of myths. We are just about to start writing our own myth based on the hero and mythical creature we have designed earlier in the week. We are looking forward already to sharing these with you at Parents' Evening so get ready for our myths such as 'Tommeseus and the Goat Man'.

In the next few weeks, we will be practicing for the Christmas Carol concert and leading the Christingle service, so make sure you join us for those events!




Funny | Fantasy
