



Acorn Class

Acorn class have settled really well. I am proud of them all, especially those whose first time it is away from their parents. Thank you for trusting us to care for your children.

Our topic this term is "Marvelous Me". We have been looking at who we are, our feelings and emotions and this week naming parts of our bodies. We have also been learning to share and take turns.

Reception children have started to learn their phonics sounds, the first step in their reading journey. They are learning to blend and trying hard to write the new sounds. Name writing is also a daily activity.

We have been singing lots of nursery rhymes and counting songs as well as taking part in dough disco every day to increase our hand strength.

Forest school was the highlight of our week and we enjoyed climbing trees, playing on the rope bridge and swing, and exploring the area.





We have also visited the library bus, and each borrowed a book for the classroom. It was very exciting, and we are enjoying sharing the books in the classroom.





Maple Class

In Maple class we have been learning how to work together as a team - team Maple. We learned how to share, how to be kind and how to keep our classroom tidy. Children have been collecting ducks in a jar, and as a reward they chose to play outside with bikes. On Friday, the last duck "swam" into the jar, so Maple class had a wonderful time riding bikes and scooters.





In history we have been learning about changes within living memory and beyond living memory. Then we looked at how toys change depending on your age, and children wrote predictions about what toys they will no longer be playing with when they are older (when they are 10 years old). We watched a video about how toys have changed in the last 100 years. We were very lucky because a parent brought some toys in that she played with as a child, and even some that her mum had when she was a child! Children could explore the toys, and they loved it. Thank you, Mrs. Dyke!





In geography, we are learning about continents, and children have learned a song to help them remember the names of all seven continents. Ask them to sing it to you. Extremely catchy song. It goes.... Asia, Africa, North and South America, Antarctica, Europe, and finally Australia.





Rowan Class

In Rowan Class we have been learning about the different types of rocks. We sorted rocks into igneous (made from cooled molten rock), sedimentary (formed from layers of small grains of rock) and metamorphic (rocks changed by heat or pressure). We have also been testing rocks to see if they are chalk or limestone. We did this by placing a small amount of vinegar on rocks. Vinegar is an acid, and it reacts to the chalk or limestone by fizzing.



Rocks also links to our reading book about how the Earth began and to our History learning about the Stone Age. We now know what Palaeolithic, Mesolithic and Neolithic mean. We have decided we would have liked to have gone on a woolly mammoth hunt!

The Woolly Mammoth had several adaptations for the cold, such as a thick, shaggy coat, and short ears to minimize heat loss.





In Oak class, we have settled well back into school life and the routine. This half term we are working on the children becoming more independent learners and have introduced task planners and a visual timetable to encourage them to take ownership of their own learning in the classroom. 


In our science lessons, we have been looking for similarities and differences between mammals, amphibians, insects and birds. Challenge your children at home by asking them which animals biochemically change, metamorphosize, give birth to live young or have larvae or pupa stages! In Geography, we have been researching countries and cities of Europe, South

of Europe, South America, and North America – how many can you name?

> Also, in the next couple of weeks, we will be reintroducing homework. Year 6 children will receive a Reading, Maths and GPS CGPS book from school and will be set 10-minute tests to start to get ready for SATs. Year 5 children will be receiving something similar. There will also be some spellings to support the development of the children's spelling abilities. Homework will be set on a Thursday and will be due on the following Wednesday.

An inspiring and confidence-building picture book that follows a boy going to school for the first time. Ideal for reading and sharing with children starting a new school, class, or activity.



Beetle Boy by MG Leonard

When Darkus' dad vanishes he finds himself living next to the neighbours from hell. When things seemingly can't get any worse, a super-intelligent talking beetle comes to the rescue. Anarchic, funny, and at times completely mad – with a hint of Roald Dahl. This is a gripping storytime read-aloud that pupils will look forward to each day.
